What aspects of the four purposes do you feel that require further attention - do you have ideas about the way forward?

- Personal and social, listening, reading, numeracy, first aid, set up a business and cooking.
- Independence, perseverance, self-confidence and respect for others.
- Language and communicating with each other in Welsh, Health and wellbeing
- Numeracy, literacy, working independently and being ambitious.
- To be independent and confident individuals, that know how to look after their mental wellbeing and physical health, who are not afraid to take risks or be ambitious, and to learn that it is OK to make mistakes and that we learn from them.



- Developing the children's growth mindset.
- Give more responsibility to the children, especially Year 6. Guide and support them, and let them take responsibility e.g. a playtime club for the Foundation Phase. To be ambitious, rewarding, and continue with the encouragement to succeed.
- Give each individual the support they need, and help the children develop their confidence
- Give them experiences that are engaging to learn new things and enjoy.
- That they try to solve the problem independently before asking for help, making sure we don't do too much for them and that they have the opportunity to develop the skills to be independent. Encourage and be supportive as they try new things and teach them that they must have initiative and persevere to be ambitious

- The 4 purposes in general by holding special days perhaps something like a "celebration of purpose day" where one purpose is addressed that day through activities, celebrating successes and rewarding.
- Able and ambitious, find different ways for them to work i.e. practical tasks if they have difficulty reading and writing.
- I think the ambitious, capable one is the most difficult, the 'able' needs to be thought through carefully. Encourage the children to accept that they have different strengths and that everyone is able to shine in their own way. I feel we need to think "outside the box" with this one.

Curriculum for Wales - Staff questionnaire

Which experience do the pupils in your class enjoy the most?

- Practical experiences that are necessary to everyday life e.g. cooking. The forest school is also a favourite, and any activity that doesn't involve sitting by a table.
- Playing in the learning areas.
- Experiences and opportunities to be independent.
- Coding, Forest School and swimming lessons.
- They respond best when they are outside in the forest school, or doing woodwork, They enjoy gardening and visiting places like the library.

Curriculum for Wales - Staff questionnaire

What would you like the pupils to learn about Wales?

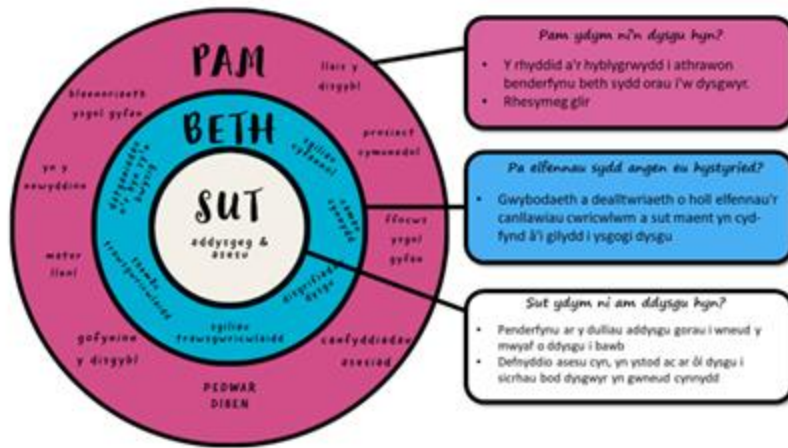
Holistic skills

Developing holistic skills is an important part of planning the learning experiences in our curriculum. Holistic skills support the development of the whole child within the six areas of learning, and it is important that they are consistently interwoven in our curriculum.

Literacy, numeracy and digital framework



Literacy, numeracy and digital competence are compulsory cross-curricular skills within the Curriculum for Wales. This means that we must ensure development in the skills below across all areas of the curriculum.

Literacy: translingualism, listening, reading, speaking and writing in Welsh and English.

Numeracy: mathematical proficiency, the number system and comparing the relationships between numbers and sizes, geometry - shapes, space, position, statistics and probability.

Digital competence: citizenship, interaction and collaboration, production and data.

When planning our curriculum, it is important to think **WHY**, **WHAT** AND **HOW** to ensure that all the experiences are valuable, have a positive impact, inspire, and help the learner to progress in their education journey.

Relationships and sexuality education

We support learners to develop the skills to have healthy and safe relationships with other people, as well as the ability to make sense of their own thoughts and feelings. We will help learners to turn to factual sources about their sexual and reproductive health and well-being. We offer learners opportunities to learn about all forms of discrimination, violence, abuse and neglect, to enable them to recognise unsafe relationships and situations helping them to seek help if necessary.

Cross-cutting themes

Human rights

Each of the four purposes enables our pupils to learn about their human rights, mapped by the Children's Commissioner for Wales.

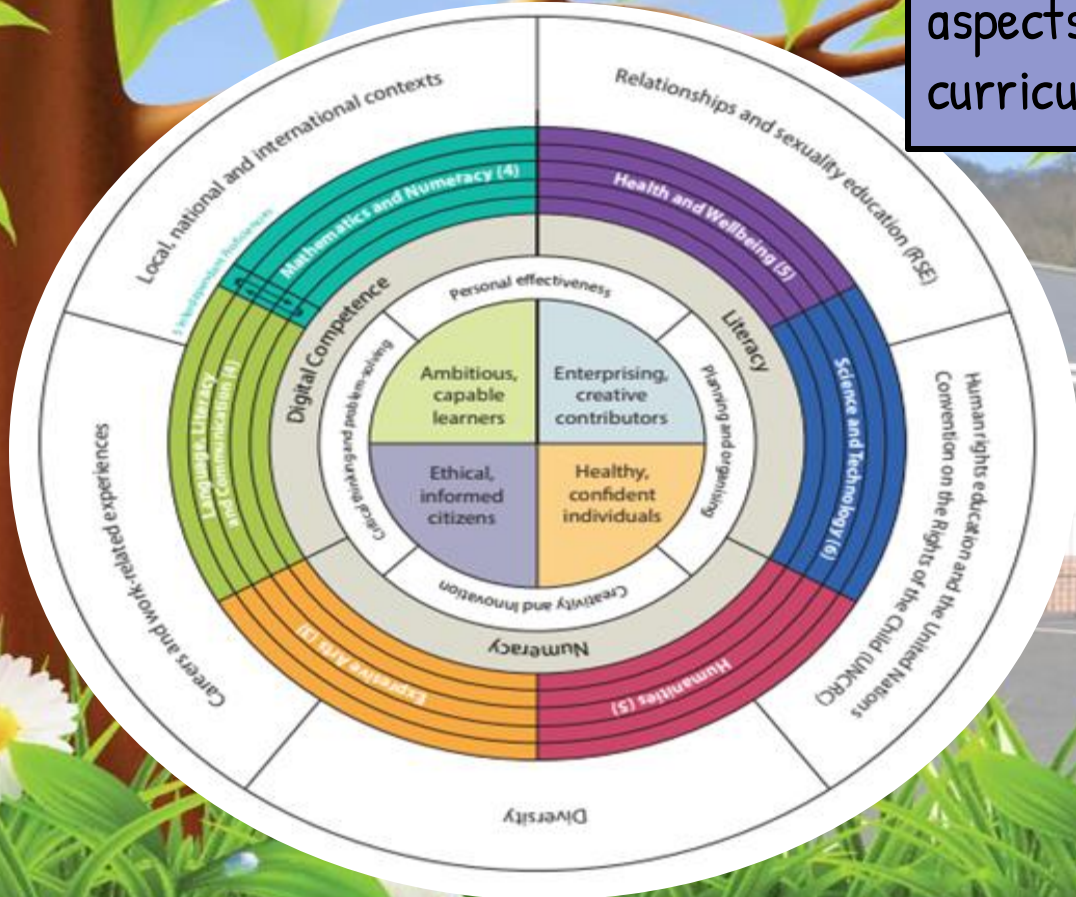

Forest Schools

By holding Forest School sessions we support children to develop self-esteem, creativity, independence and self-confidence outdoors led by the children. In addition, experiences are provided for individuals to develop their physical, emotional, cognitive and social skills. Forest Schools uses a holistic approach to learning and offers a variety of opportunities to problem solve, take risks and develop their creativity as well as some specific skills (e.g., knot tying, tree climbing and the using tools safely). At Forest School, the children develop their interests and knowledge of nature, through free play and exploring local woodland throughout the seasons. We will use the forest school area on the school site and also walk along the fields to the "Cuddfan Cymru" woodland on the Old Railway in the village.

When planning at Ysgol Bro Dyfrdwy, emphasis is placed on offering high quality, and a wide range of learning experiences to our learners. This means giving learners sufficient time to develop, practise and apply knowledge and skills. This lays firm foundations for the next stages of their learning and means that they build on their learning and progress throughout their time here.

We also plan to ensure that our learning and teaching experiences develop the skills that our learners need to achieve the 4 purposes.

Formative assessment strategies are used continuously to ensure learners' progress in the classes on a day-to-day basis and professional meetings are held to discuss the development of our pupils on a regular basis to support our children consistently.

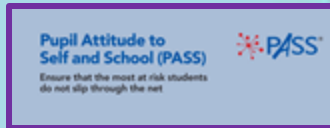
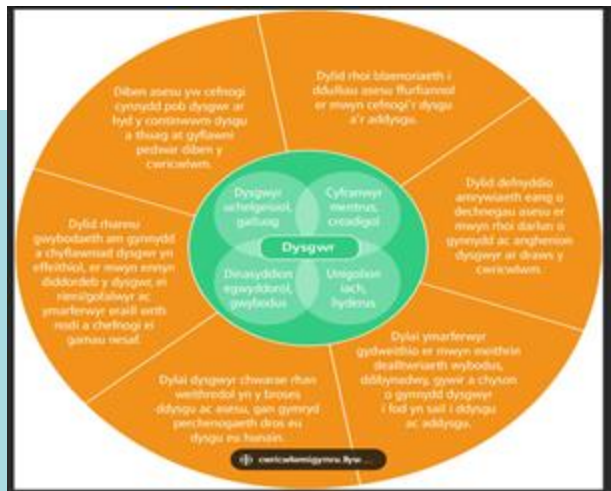
Assessments and progress

A complete picture of each learner's development, including their wellbeing, willingness and desire to learn as well as the development of their skills, knowledge and understanding is important.

The school will achieve the Purposes of Curriculum Assessment as follows:

1. **Supporting individual learners on an ongoing day-to-day basis**
2. **Identify and reflect on individual learners' progress over time**
3. **Understand the progress of groups of pupils to reflect on practice**
4. **Track the progress of our pupils to support everyone to develop consistently, and ensure that the best possible provision is in place for everyone.**

We will have professional meetings to discuss our pupils' progress regularly.



We use the Learning Descriptions for each Statement of What Matters for assessing and planning learners' progress.

These are not used as a tick box list, but rather as tools to be considered when planning our learners' progress.

In addition, there are principles of progress that underpin our planning of learners' progress across the areas over time.

We are using The Taith 360 as an assessment and progress tracking tool but also to plan the next steps for further progress. We also a tracking system to gain an overview of the journey and progress of our pupils.
